
AC Transit Serving Our Community



- California's largest public bus-only system
- 3rd largest bus only transit agency in the U.S.
- Service area: 364 square miles, 1.5 million people
- 13 cities and 8 unincorporated communities w/in Alameda and Contra Costa counties
- Operating since 1960
- Our riders...
 - 65% low income
 - 75% people of color
 - 43% riders without access to a car

AC Transit Financial Situation

- Strong financial position going into the Pandemic
- Diverse revenue streams
- One-time Federal Emergency Relief
 Funds currently benefiting the District
- Ridership and farebox revenue decline
- Deficits projected to start in FY25 once emergency funding used up
- Staff is working on solutions to this problem




Transit Service in San Leandro Today



Transit Shelter Program – Background

- For the past 20+ years, AC Transit had a 1999 Transit Shelter Agreement with Clear Channel Outdoor Advertising (CCO) to do all maintenance and capital work in exchange for advertising revenue in shelters. This agreement expires on March 2023.
- Historically, CCO used advertising revenue to pay for maintenance and capital costs.
- Revenue in transit shelters has gone down (and moved online) while costs to maintaining infrastructure has gone up.
- AC Transit is shifting to a new model that continues maintenance, advertising, and capital services that provides a more dignified bus stop waiting experience for our riders.

Transit Shelter Program – Moving Forward

On Feb 22, 2023, AC Transit's Board of Directors approved the award of two contracts: Transit Shelter Advertising Contract – Intersection LLC

- \$700,000 Minimum Annual Guarantee in advertising revenue, 5 year contract
- Installation, removal, sale, and maintenance of advertising. Potential for digital advertising.

Transit Shelter Program – Next Steps

- Goal is to finalize contracts with the vendors by April 1, 2023.
 - AC Transit will take on ownership of transit shelter assets and will continue to administer the contracts on behalf of the jurisdictions.
- AC Transit is still looking for ways to fund these contracts and streamline processes (i.e. waiving fees and fast tracking permits)
 - We will be working closely with San Leandro staff to discuss costs for maintenance and potential financial contributions.
