SAN LEANDRO, Jan. 23.—A delegation from the San Leandro Chamber of Commerce will appear before the board of supervisors Monday to urge a new road from Estudillo avenue over the hills connecting with the Redwood Canyon district. The chamber committee comprises Fred J. Hirschmann, chairman; Arthur M. Carden, city attorney; W. B. Zambresky and Judge W. J. Gannon. A protest over the condition of the present Lake Chabot road has been filed by property owners.

CHABOT ROAD WORK SPEEDED

HAYWARD, Sept. 13. — Construction of the Lake Chabot road, \$50,000 for which was provided in the new county budget, may start within 30 days, according to announcement by Charles LW. Heyer, chairman of the county board of supervisors, who declares that he will facilitate an early start on the work. The route of the road skirts the west shore of the lake. It is believed that the total cost of constructing the six miles of highway will run from \$100,000 to \$200,000, depending upon the type of surfacing.

The new road, it is declared, will not only provide an outlet for Castro Valley, Hayward and other sections on this side of the lake to the Oakland and bay region, but will provide a short cut from the Hayward section to Moraga

SAN LEANDRO, June 23.—Interest was evinced in this community today in proposals for the further improvement of the Lake Chabot Road.


Saturday, at the age of 82, Mr. Good died.


