- ACCFB is losing pandemic relief funding budget for food and site staff support is shrinking; need to be creative with how to expand supply
- Convening fifteen (15) HSD-contracted sites/partners in January to start assessing demand; even ACCFB does not have adequate demand data
- Medium-term opportunities include exploring joint purchasing agreement for more food, proteins and/or cultural options; work with Alameda Alliance for Health and local health clinics like the Tiburcio Vasquez Center to enroll patients in home-delivered groceries program
